In BC, only one in four individuals with a developmental disability report any kind of earnings. And, when they do, it is most often for minimum wage and only a small number of hours per week.
In spite of this, we know that self-advocates want to work and that supporting transitioning youth on their employment pathway is a key predictor of future positive employment outcomes. The Transitioning Youth with Disabilities and Employment (TYDE) Project is a response to this call. A group of interdisciplinary and cross-sectoral partners (www.mytyde.ca) worked together to create the TYDE Project to improve employment outcomes for transitioning youth.
In this presentation we will provide an overview of the TYDE Project, demonstrate how the TYDE Online Program works, and discuss next steps for the Project.
